

SUSK marks the 80th Anniversary of the Holodomor

This fall marks the 80th anniversary of the Holodomor. the Ukrainian famine-genocide of 1932-1933. The Holodomor (which means "extermination by famine") was an effort designed to exterminate the Ukrainian nation by means of deliberate starvation, engineered by the Soviet Stalinist regime. By imposing incredibly high grain quotas and sealing the borders of Soviet Ukraine, the Communist government sealed the fate of millions of Ukrainians, resulting in a horrendous tragedy.



Today, several countries, including Canada, have recognized the Holodomor as an act of genocide against the Ukrainian people. Canada has also established National Holodomor Memorial Day, which this year falls on Saturday, November 23, 2013. SUSK joins many other Ukrainian community organizations in preparations to commemorate this dark chapter in our history. SUSK calls upon its member Ukrainian Students' Organizations to commemorate and raise awareness of the Holodomor at universities across the country. Events may include film screenings, informational exhibits/displays, lectures, seminars, and memorial events.

Included in this release is a pamphlet produced by the Ukrainian Canadian Congress National Holodomor Education Committee, which lists useful resources for hosting Holodomor-related events. Also included is a publication by the Ukrainian Canadian Congress National Holodomor Awareness Committee, which includes useful information about the Holodomor, personal stories from Holodomor survivors, and a list of commemorative events taking place this fall in communities across the country.

80th Commemoration of the HOLODOMOR 1932-33

Famine-Genocide in Ukraine



- Holodomor, the Famine-Genocide in Ukraine, was a political action perpetrated by an occupying Soviet regime.
- Current research indicates that millions perished.
- The Holodomor was recognized as genocide by the Government of Canada (2008).
- Many schools across Canada hold special events to remember the Holodomor victims on the 4th Friday in November.

HOLODOMOR MEMORIAL DAY ANNOUNCEMENT

Eighty years ago, millions of Ukrainians were deliberately starved to death. This engineered famine is known as *Holodomor*, which means "inflicting death by starvation".

Ukraine was a republic of the Soviet Union in 1932-33. The Communist regime first took the people's land, then seized all the grain in Ukraine. In many areas, it confiscated all other food as well, leaving farmers and their families with nothing to eat.

The harvest had been plentiful, but the Ukrainian people were forbidden from keeping any of it, and millions of Ukrainians starved while Soviet authorities sold the grain or exported it abroad.

Five Ears of Grain

August 7, 1932: Stalin authored a law which punished by death or 10-year imprisonment any misappropriation of collective farm property. This led to mass arrests and executions. Even children searching for grain left in fields were convicted. The law became known as "Five Ears of Grain".

During the
Holodomor and for
seventy years
afterwards, the
USSR denied the
famine. It was
unlawful to mention
it. Many in the
West, especially
those sympathetic
to the Communist
regime, chose to
disbelieve accounts

of intentional starvation. With the collapse of the USSR in 1991, archives were opened for the first time for Holodomor researchers.

Through Acts of Parliament, the governments of Canada and five provinces, including Ontario, recognize this act as genocide and set aside a day of remembrance for the millions who were starved to death, many of whom were children. In many schools across Canada, this is done on the 4th Friday in November. Many survivors have descendants now living in Canada.



Eighty years have passed since famine raged through Ukraine eradicating the lives of millions of children, women and men from one of the world's most bountiful lands. This was the Holodomor, the Ukrainian famine-genocide of 1932-33.

The Ukrainian Canadian Congress with its member organizations throughout the country annually organizes National Holodomor Awareness Week with the goal of uniting Canadians in paying tribute to the memory of the victims while celebrating the determination and future of a nation.

Ukraine remembers - the World acknowledges



The Holodomor

In the early 1930s, in the very heart of Europe - in a region considered to be Europe's breadbasket - Stalin's Communist regime committed a horrendous act of genocide against the Ukrainian people. An ancient nation of agriculturists was subjected to starvation, one of the most ruthless forms of torture and death. The government imposed exorbitant grain quotas, in some cases confiscating supplies down to the last seed. In many villages special troops were brought in to gather any and all food that could be found. The territory of Soviet Ukraine and the predominantly Ukrainian-populated Kuban region of the Northern Caucasus (Soviet Russia) were isolated by armed units, so that people could not go in search of food to the neighbouring Soviet regions where it was more readily available. The result was the Ukrainian genocide of 1932-33, known in Ukrainian as the Holodomor, or extermination by famine.



The Numbers

- The 1931 harvest was 18.3 million tons of grain.
- The 1932 harvest was 14.6 million tons of grain.
- · The 1933 harvest was 22.3 million tons of grain.
- The Soviet regime dumped 1.7 million tons of grain on the Western markets at the height of the Holodomor.
- At the height of the Holodomor Ukrainian villagers were dying at the rate of 25,000 per day or 1,000 per hour or 17 per minute.
- Children comprised one-third of the Holodomor victims in Ukraine. Large numbers of children were orphaned and became homeless.
- The Ukrainian population was reduced by as much as 25 percent.

The Denial

- The Soviet Government refused to acknowledge to the international community the starvation in Ukraine and turned down international offers of assistance.
- Welsh journalist Gareth Jones first alerted the world in 1933 to the rampant starvation in Ukraine.
- Walter Duranty of the New York Times set the tone for most of the Western press coverage with authoritative denials of starvation. According to British Diplomatic Reports, however, Duranty conceded off the record that "as many as 10 million may have perished."

The Genocide

The Holodomor conforms to the definition of the crime according to the UN Convention on Genocide. The Communist regime targeted the Ukrainians, in the sense of a civic nation, in Soviet Ukraine, and as an ethnic group in Soviet Russia, especially in the predominantly Ukrainian Kuban region of the Northern Caucasus.

The Recognition

Internationally, 16 countries have officially recognized the Holodomor as an act of genocide.

In Canada, the Government of Canada unanimously passed Bill C-459, the *Ukrainian Famine and Genocide* ("Holodomor") Memorial Day Act which came into force by Royal Assent on May 29, 2008. The Act recognizes the Holodomor as an act of genocide and proclaims the fourth Saturday of each November Holodomor Memorial Day.

The Provinces of Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Alberta, Ontario and Quebec have passed similar legislation.

The international campaign continues for all countries of the world, and the United Nations to recognize the Holodomor, Ukrainian Famine-Genocide of 1932-33 as a genocide of the Ukrainian people.

Learning about the Holodomor

The Ukrainian Canadian Congress National Holodomor Education Committee (NHEC) is actively working toward the recognition and inclusion of the Holodomor in school curricula across Canada.

Each year, more school boards continue to add the fourth Friday in November as Holodomor Memorial Day to their school calendars. In most of these schools, an announcement on the Holodomor is read, and in Catholic boards, special prayers are included. In some school boards, special events are organized, with teachers of all grades encouraged to plan lessons around the topic of the Holodomor. The Edmonton Catholic School Board, for example, has prepared a special program and has added the topic of the Holodomor on their website.

The NHEC provides expertise and consultations on the Holodomor to ministries of education and school boards.

Holodomor Research and Education Consortium established at U of A

A major goal of NHEC has been the establishment of a permanent organization with a mandate to educate the public about the Holodomor. The Holodomor Research and Education Consortium (HREC) of the Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies, University of Alberta, was created in 2013 through the generosity of the Temerty Family Foundation. HREC:

- Promotes Holodomor awareness and understanding.
- · Prepares educational materials and resources.
- · Conducts teacher training sessions.
- Fosters research.
- Ensures that the Holodomor is represented in history and genocide teaching.

Holodomor Writing Competition

The Holodomor Writing Competition, sponsored by the Ukrainian Canadian Congress, is a competition open to all students in high schools across Canada. Using historical facts of the 1932-33 Holodomor in Ukraine, students may choose to write in one of five categories: historical short fiction, historical research essay, poetry or lyrics for a song, interview with or biography of survivor, dramatic skit or short play.

The Commemorative Logo

Wheat – the symbol of life, prosperity, spiritual wealth. It is the grain which, for centuries, has been associated with our nation's livelihood. During the 1932-33 Holodomor, however, it became a weapon of the genocide orchestrated to destroy the very fabric of that nation.

On August 7, 1932, Joseph Stalin authored a law with a sentence of death or 10 years' imprisonment for the misappropriation of collective farm property. This law led to mass arrests and executions. Even children caught picking handfuls of grain from fields were convicted. It became known as the law of **Five ears of grain**.

The international logo selected for the 80th commemorative year was designed by Ukrainian Canadian artist Oleh Lesiuk. While serving as a reminder of the devastation characterized by the law, the wheat symbolizes the Ukrainian nation's determination to live and prosper; the nation's future.




